**THE HUMANITIES AND POPULAR STRUGGLES IN SA**

There has been an upsurge of interest in the Humanities and their roles in contemporary South Africa over the last few months. A report commissioned by the Minister of Higher Education, entitled, The Charter for the Humanities and Social Sciences, as well as the Consensus Study on the State of the Humanities in South Africa done under the auspices of the Academy of Science of South Africa have served as two vital reference points for current discussions and debate. This Colloquium attempts to situate Humanities and Social Science disciplines within a broader historical framework, especially in relation to their roles in the various problems and struggles of the local and global communities they inhabit. There have been dramatic changes in our society since 1994. Yet, in as much as our society has changed in certain respects, it has also remained the same in others. Within this context, the Colloquium is concerned with the dialectic of how humanities disciplines have been affected by societal changes as well as how they have contributed to them. It is designed to provide a platform for discussions on how it might be possible for us to reflect on our roles as scholars in relation to the broader society. There was a time when university-based scholars were central to the crucial debates in the various positions adopted in the struggle against apartheid. Today, under conditions of democracy, they are conspicuous by their absence in these debates. The Colloquium will enliven discussions on new paradigms and approaches for critical engagement on ways to make a positive contribution towards social change in the current period.
